Transcript for chapter 3 of 12: Impact

Sarah, 3 months after surgery, and mother <u>Frances</u> - The impact that epilepsy would've had on Sarah's life was mainly at school because her concentration wasn't the best.

<u>Maree</u>, 11 months after grid monitoring and surgery, and husband Rob - Mum always used to say to me that I was always such an active child. When my epilepsy started at the age of 12 I normally had.

Mark, 7 years after surgery - I was married with two young children. They were five and three. I was a sales representative, so my job involved driving. I had just moved into a new house. When I started having seizures, everything just went up in the air. I didn't know what was going to happen.

<u>Maree</u> and husband Rob- One thing I wasn't able to get was my licence and that was hard. I found that quite hard to accept because it was something I was looking forward to. I had always thought I would grow out of this epilepsy. But I got to the age of 18 and I hadn't grown out of it. It was coming to terms with the fact that I might have this for the rest of my life. I found that to be a really hard time.

<u>Denise</u> and Frank's son, Luc, had surgery 1 year ago - I was really, really worried because I could see that it was having a huge impact on his whole life. We were really wondering what's going to happen to him? What sort of a future has he got?

<u>Maree</u> and husband Rob - I just thought that whatever I have, I'll just get on with life. Continue to live my life and work my way around these seizures, I guess.
